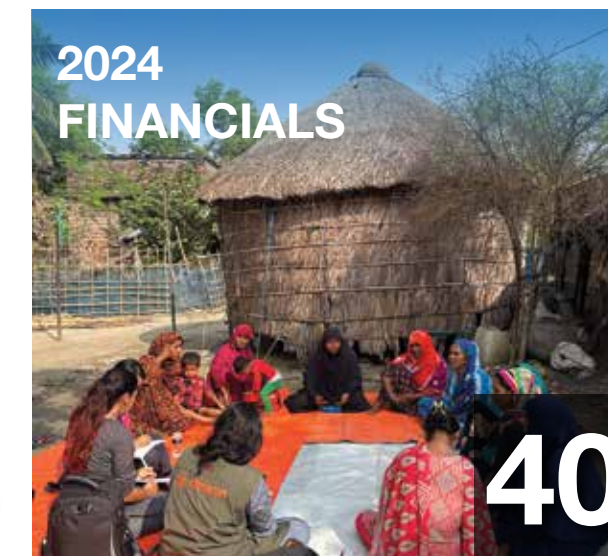

LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

To Our Compassionate Supporters,

As you read this 2024 Annual Report, I hope you'll pause – not just to take in the numbers, but to reflect on the lives behind them.

This past year, thanks to your unwavering support, ShelterBox provided life-saving aid to more than 270,000 people across 17 countries. In places like Gaza, Somalia, Cameroon, Malawi, across the Caribbean, and even here in the United States, families who had lost everything were met with something powerful: hope. With tents, tools, shelter kits, blankets, solar lanterns, winter clothing, hygiene kits and more, we helped families begin the journey to recovery.

In 2024, ShelterBox responded to Cyclone Remal, a powerful storm that struck southern Bangladesh displacing more than 800,000 people. We responded in Chad to the urgent needs of refugee families fleeing violence in neighboring Sudan. This crisis, largely absent from international headlines, has caused hundreds of thousands of people to cross the border in search of safety. In Western North Carolina, we delivered emergency kits with sleeping bags, solar lights, water filters, and cook-stoves to families reeling from Hurricane Helene—a once-in-1,000-years storm that leveled homes, bridges, and entire communities. And in every corner of the world we reached,

ShelterBox delivered more than aid. We delivered stability, hope, and the tools for families to begin again.

This year also marks a deeply meaningful milestone: 25 years of humanitarian service. What began as a small Rotary-led effort in 2000 has now provided shelter to more than three million people worldwide. That's not just a statistic. That's three million mothers, fathers, children—each with a story of loss, and thanks to you, a path forward.

And yet, the need continues to grow. The scale, frequency, and severity of disasters, driven by conflict and intensified by the climate crisis, are accelerating.

Today, over 123 million people are forcibly displaced around the world. That's 1 in every 67 people on the planet.

Your participation and investment in ShelterBox is very meaningful. Every dollar you give makes an impact. Every tarp, every solar light, every emergency tent is a symbol of solidarity—a message that someone, somewhere, cares. That recovery is possible. That they are not forgotten. As you read the stories and impact shared throughout this report, I hope you'll feel proud—not just of what ShelterBox has done, but of what you have made possible. Together, we're restoring hope, creating resilience, and standing with people when they need it most.

Thank you for being part of the ShelterBox movement. With your continued partnership, we're ready to do even more in 2025. Because no one should be without shelter after disaster.

In 2024, we continued to reduce our environmental impact:

Implemented a Supplier Code of Conduct to ensure ethical and environmental alignment.

Joined the Climate Accelerator Action Working Group to measure the carbon footprint of aid items.

Replaced non-essential plastic packaging with paper alternatives, eliminating the use of over 500,000 pieces of plastic in five years.

Prioritized sea freight and began storing aid in West and Central Africa to optimize stock movement.

CUSTOM SHELTER SOLUTIONS

Every disaster is different. We customize shelter support to each context.

STANDARD RELIEF TENT

Our durable family-sized tents enable families to come together and feel safe and protected as they begin rebuilding their lives and homes.



GEODESIC TENT

The Geodesic Family Tent, developed by experts from the IFRC, ICRC, and UNHCR, is built to endure the world's toughest conditions—high winds, extreme heat, and freezing temperatures—providing safety and dignity for families in crisis.



UNITED NATIONS (UN) TENT

These unbranded tents, built to UN specifications, are used in conflict zones where visible aid branding poses risks. In crisis settings, they offer families a durable, secure space to come together and feel protected.



SHELTER KIT

In some communities, our Shelter Kits – containing tools, heavy duty tarpaulins, ropes, and fixings – are needed to create emergency shelter or to repair damaged homes making them livable again.



TENT LEVELING WITH CONCRETE BASE

Ground leveling for tents is normally constructed using cement blocks, gravel and casted cement to make emergency shelter more durable and increase protection from flooding and extreme weather conditions.



TRANSITIONAL SHELTER

These are designed for longer-term temporary use, offering stability for families who cannot return home soon. Constructed with materials like timber, cement, sand, and corrugated iron, they provide a more robust solution than emergency tents.

BURKINA FASO, CAMEROON, ETHIOPIA

DURABLE SHELTER

Durable shelters are intended for extended use, often in situations where families are displaced for years. These structures are built to last and withstand environmental challenges and include framing materials, timber, cement, sand, and corrugated iron sheeting for roofing and doors, along with community training for proper construction.

ANARC / BANGLADESH

Anarc is 92 years old and a lifelong resident of a village in Deluti Union, Bangladesh. When Cyclone Remal struck in May 2024, Anarc took refuge in a local cyclone shelter as 75 mph winds and torrential rains battered his community. After the storm, he returned to find his home nearly wiped away – “little more than a fragile corner of what once was,” he said.

Despite the devastation, Anarc refused to abandon his land. He camped in the wreckage of his house, determined to rebuild. That’s when ShelterBox aid arrived. We provided Anarc with essential shelter

materials: tarpaulins, tools, corrugated iron sheeting, and other supplies to construct a new home, plus a kitchen set and solar light. With the help of neighbors, and some technical guidance from our partner Uttaran, Anarc rebuilt a simple but sturdy house on his old plot. He also received a small cash grant to hire a mason for the toughest parts of construction. Standing by his rebuilt home, Anarc told us,

“This has given me hope. I can repair my house and live the rest of my life in comfort instead of discomfort.”

At his age, a safe home is everything – and because of supporters like you, Anarc can spend his twilight years in the comfort of his own rebuilt shelter.

SALMAN / GAZA

In October 2023, renewed conflict in Gaza triggered relentless airstrikes and forced nearly 90% of the population from their homes. Families fled with only what they could carry, many displaced over and over again as designated “safe zones” were repeatedly hit. Among those displaced was Salman.

Originally from the Turkman neighborhood, Salman has been forced to evacuate his home more than a dozen times. “This is probably my fifteenth or sixteenth evacuation,” he shares. “Each one feels like an exile. It’s a process of torment—away from home, which is no longer there.”

Now sheltering in a designated humanitarian zone, Salman lives in a ShelterBox tent with two of his children. His remaining family members are displaced across Gaza in other displacement camps. “Everyone is scattered. We don’t know when we’ll be reunited, or how we’ll survive until then,” he says. “Sometimes it takes months to hear from any of them. No communication, no internet, nothing is available.” Despite the harsh conditions—scorching heat, limited food

and water, and constant instability—Salman remains resilient. With support from ShelterBox and our local partner, Social Development Forum (SDF), his family received an emergency tent, mattresses, and essential supplies. “Receiving them supports us to sustain and survive,” he explains. “The tent is suitable, comfortable, and equipped with proper ventilation.”

Salman’s story is one of tens of thousands. In 2024, ShelterBox responded in Gaza with emergency shelter and lifesaving aid to families facing unimaginable hardship. Amid devastation, these tents offer not just shelter, but also dignity and protection.

Because of your support, ShelterBox is able to stand beside families like Salman’s in their darkest hours. Thank you for helping us deliver shelter and comfort, and hope in one of the world’s most urgent crises.

LUCY / GRENADA

When Hurricane Beryl slammed into Carriacou, Grenada, 65-year-old Lucy braced for the worst. She couldn't evacuate. Instead, she and her disabled son sheltered in the only part of their home still standing—the bathroom—praying that the walls wouldn't collapse around them.

"You could feel the force of the wind," she said. "We stayed in the bathroom until everything was over. When we came out, everything had disappeared around us."

Beryl, a Category 4 storm, had destroyed her roof, collapsed her walls, and left her with nothing but the will to survive. Yet, Lucy's spirit remained unshaken.

"We are alive. Where there is life, there is hope," she told us. "We will be back, and we will be back stronger. We just need the help."

That help came in the form of a ShelterBox tent and essential supplies—mosquito nets, a kitchen set, a solar light, blankets. It was enough to begin again.

For Lucy, the shelter wasn't just about survival—it restored her dignity and gave her the tools to care for her son, cook meals, and sleep safely through the night. The solar light alone makes it possible for her to tend to him after dark.

Lucy's strength—and your support—proves that shelter is more than a structure. It's a foundation for recovery and a beacon of hope in life's most uncertain moments.

"I got the tent, which I love, so bad," Lucy said, laughing through her resilience. "I love it. I love it, love it, love it... It's my little house. I've made it comfortable for me. It feels like I'm in my room again."

VICTORIA / MALAWI

When severe flooding struck Malawi in February 2024, Victoria and her husband Christopher watched their bamboo home—and everything inside it—wash away. With their two young sons, they fled their lakeside village and found temporary refuge with relatives of the local village chief.

It was a moment of profound loss—but not the end of their story. With support from ShelterBox and our local partner, CARE Malawi, Victoria and her family received a shelter kit, essential household supplies, and a small cash grant. These tools allowed them to take the first steps toward rebuilding with dignity.

“We paid rent for the year to stay here, which we paid from the cash we received,” Victoria explained. “We also used the money to buy the poles to build this temporary house.”

The simple structure gave the family more than a roof—it gave them independence.

Now, with stability and safety restored, Victoria and Christopher are focused on the future. They’ve used the remainder of their cash assistance to launch a small business selling fish from the lake—laying the groundwork for a more secure and permanent life away from flood-prone areas.

“We don’t plan to go back to lake land,” Victoria said. “We will build a permanent place here through the money we generate from our new business.”

Thanks to your support, families like Victoria’s are rebuilding their lives with strength, stability, and hope.

“This temporary shelter gives us our own home, rather than having to live with other people. The mosquito nets keep us safe from malaria. We lost all our items, but now we have blankets and pots that we can use to restart our lives.”

NURTA / SOMALIA

Nurta, a 35-year-old mother of five, once lived a peaceful life in rural Somalia. Her family farmed sorghum, sesame, and maize, selling their crops at the market. Her childhood memories were filled with goats, shade trees, and simple contentment. But that life has vanished.

Over the years, repeated droughts forced Nurta and her family to flee their home—not once, but twice. In their most recent journey, they walked for three months in search of safety and stability. Along the way, they struggled to find food and water. Some of her children were hospitalized for malnutrition.

“Life back in the days was way easier than today,” Nurta said. “We were content with what we had—but now that is all taken away from us.” When Nurta and her family arrived in a city in southwest Somalia, they finally received the support they so desperately needed. ShelterBox, in partnership with Juba Foundation, provided a durable shelter and essential household items.

“Before moving here, we felt uncertain about our future. This new shelter gives us stability—we’ve been guaranteed to remain here for at least four years.”

The shelter gave Nurta’s family privacy, security, and relief. Solar lights allowed her to safely visit the toilet at night. Kitchen tools helped her resume daily routines. Most importantly, her children now have a safe place to rest, learn, and begin again.

Looking ahead, Nurta dreams of starting a business in the camp—dyeing fabric and sewing clothing. She hopes her children will grow up with education and opportunity. And one day, if conditions improve, she hopes to return home.

“My hope for the future is to live a joyful life, a life where I’m not forced to move.”

In 2024, our longstanding partnership with Rotary International continued to be a cornerstone of our disaster relief efforts as we worked side-by-side to deliver lifesaving aid to communities in need.

Rotary members serve as donors, volunteers, and response team members, providing invaluable on-the-ground support. In 2024, Rotary’s support was as critical as ever. From the Americas to Africa and Asia, Rotary clubs and volunteers provided critical fundraising, local expertise, and “all hands on deck” support.

Together, Rotary and ShelterBox made a lifesaving difference for countless families worldwide in 2024.

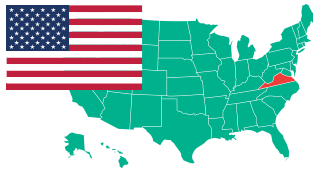

HURRICANE HELENE NORTH CAROLINA, USA

In the aftermath of back-to-back hurricanes, Rotary Zones 33 and 34 mobilized thousands of local Rotarians to lead relief efforts across Florida, Georgia, and the Carolinas—coordinating the distribution of emergency food, clean water, shelter materials, and hygiene supplies to the hardest-hit communities.

ShelterBox USA partnered with Rotary Zone 33/34 to expand these efforts, providing a \$100,000 matching grant to the Disaster Recovery Fund and delivering hundreds of warm comforters, zero-degree sleeping bags, solar lanterns, cookstoves, family-sized tents, water filters, and aid bags—ensuring families had the tools and protection they needed to survive and begin rebuilding.

HURRICANE BERYL GRENADA

When Hurricane Beryl devastated the Caribbean, Rotary volunteers played a crucial role in assessing the damage and distributing aid in affected communities. Rotary clubs across the region, including those in neighboring islands and the United States, also spearheaded fundraising efforts to support the response, ensuring that those affected received the assistance they desperately needed.

CONFLICT GAZA

In the ongoing crisis in Gaza, Rotary's global network was vital in overcoming the logistical challenges of delivering ShelterBox aid. They facilitated the transport of supplies from Jordan to Gaza and helped navigate the Rafah border crossing from Egypt. With their support, trucks loaded with tarpaulins, blankets, water carriers, and other lifesaving items reached the displaced families who needed them most. Rotary's advocacy and logistical expertise ensured that ShelterBox could provide timely relief in an environment of extreme complexity.

CYCLONE REMAL & FLOODING BANGLADESH

In Bangladesh, the devastating effects of Cyclone Remal and monsoon flooding left hundreds of thousands of families without homes. Rotary volunteers in Bangladesh played a critical role in securing visas for ShelterBox response teams and providing valuable on-the-ground assessments to identify the most urgent needs. This close collaboration allowed ShelterBox to deliver shelter materials and water filters quickly and efficiently, bringing much-needed relief to over 5,800 families affected by the disaster.

In each of these cases, the partnership between ShelterBox and Rotary led to faster, more efficient responses, helping us reach more families and provide them with the shelter, safety, and hope they urgently needed. By combining ShelterBox's shelter aid expertise with Rotary's grassroots mobilization and extensive local knowledge, we ensured that no community was left behind.

DROUGHT & CONFLICT ETHIOPIA

ShelterBox's large-scale response to the ongoing conflict and drought in Ethiopia helped provide shelter and essentials to over 38,500 displaced individuals. Rotary members in Ethiopia worked alongside our teams at distribution sites, ensuring that aid reached those in need in an organized and dignified manner. Their presence reinforced the trust of local communities and helped ensure that families received the necessary support in a timely and compassionate way.

TROPICAL STORM TRAMI PHILIPPINES

In October 2024, Tropical Storm Trami—locally known as Kristine—unleashed torrential rains and severe flooding across the Philippines, displacing nearly a million people and damaging over 200,000 homes. ShelterBox's team in Cebu responded swiftly, collaborating with local partners and Rotary clubs to provide emergency shelter and essential supplies to thousands of affected families. This included tarpaulins, corrugated iron sheeting, tools, and cash grants to help families begin rebuilding their homes.

In 2024, Rotary clubs and Rotarians contributed over \$840,000 to ShelterBox USA and dedicated countless hours of volunteer service. As we move forward, this partnership – now in its third decade – continues to grow and strengthen, uniting our organizations in the mission to shelter those in need, no matter where disaster strikes.



WORKING HAND- IN-HAND WITH OUR PARTNERS

A Locally-Led Approach

In 2024, our partnerships, from local NGOs to global institutions, corporations, and dedicated volunteers, were key to ShelterBox's success. Together, we provided shelter, warmth, and hope to families rebuilding after disaster. These collaborations enhanced our ability to respond quickly and effectively, showcasing the strength of working together in times of crisis.

Collaboration with local organizations is key to ShelterBox's approach, ensuring our aid is timely, culturally relevant, and sustainable. These partnerships bridge the gap between emergency response and long-term recovery. Through these partnerships, we extended our reach and strengthened our impact, making a lasting difference in communities affected by disaster.

BANGLADESH

In Bangladesh, our partnership with Uttaran helped us quickly distribute shelter kits and cash grants after Cyclone Remal. Uttaran also led community training on safe construction, empowering locals to rebuild stronger homes.

SOMALIA

In Somalia, we teamed up with the Juba Foundation to provide shelter to 16,000 people in drought and conflict-stricken regions, offering safety and dignity to displaced families.

YEMEN

In Yemen, BCHR led the construction and improvement of shelters for 9,000 people, providing stability amid the ongoing conflict. ShelterBox's support ensured a foundation for long-term recovery.

SYRIA AND LEBANON

In Syria and Lebanon, we worked with Basmeh & Zeitooneh and ReliefAid to distribute winterization kits and other essential aid to vulnerable communities, ensuring help reached those in hard-to-access areas.

INSTITUTIONAL AND GOVERNMENT COLLABORATIONS

Coordinating for Greater Impact

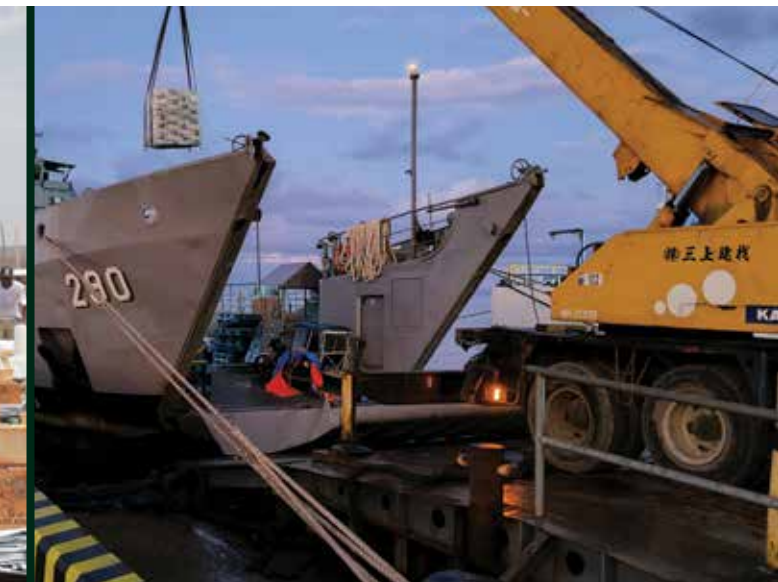
While ShelterBox's funding is mainly private, our collaborations with government and institutional partners enhance the scale and effectiveness of our response.

ETHIOPIA

In Ethiopia, we worked with IOM to support 38,500 displaced people, providing shelter materials, mosquito nets, and bedding. In Chad, our partnership with UNHCR helped deliver tents and set up permanent camps for Sudanese refugees.

PHILIPPINES

During typhoons in the Philippines, we coordinated with national disaster management agencies and the Department of Social Welfare and Development to ensure aid reached the hardest-hit areas efficiently.



LEVERAGING CORPORATE AND FOUNDATION SUPPORT

The Key to Scaling Reach and Impact

In 2024, corporate partners and foundations were vital in expanding our relief efforts. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints provided both volunteers and grants, supporting our hurricane response in Grenada.

In response to Hurricanes Helene in North Carolina, ShelterBox’s corporate partnership with Amazon Disaster Relief ensured the rapid mobilization of emergency shelter and essential aid to families displaced by the storms.

Amazon’s ability to deliver relief supplies overnight to a warehouse in Greensboro enabled Rotary and ShelterBox workers to get aid into the hands of affected communities without delay. This efficiency was instrumental in addressing immediate shelter needs, reinforcing the impact of well-coordinated disaster response efforts.

In addition to logistics and shipping, Amazon’s generous donation of aid items was critical to ShelterBox’s project and greatly impacted the lives of families who were able to quickly receive these items.

VOLUNTEERS MAKE SHELTER POSSIBLE

The Heart of Our Operations

In 2024, our volunteers were critical to ShelterBox’s success. Over 150 ShelterBox USA Ambassadors raised hundreds of thousands of dollars through presentations at schools, churches, and community events, inspiring new supporters and keeping our mission visible.

On the ground, ShelterBox Response Team (SRT) members deployed rapidly to disaster zones like Türkiye and Syria, working with Rotary and local teams to distribute tents in remote villages despite logistical challenges from ongoing recovery efforts.

We also relied on the support of host families and community groups, who provided lodging, transportation, and translation services, ensuring our teams could deliver aid efficiently where it was most needed. Their behind-the-scenes support made a lasting impact on our operations.

Every ShelterBox volunteer plays a vital role in helping families recover after disaster. Whether you’re giving your time, sharing your voice, or using your skills, you’re part of a global movement bringing shelter and hope to people in crisis.

There’s a role for everyone. Which one speaks to you? No matter how you choose to get involved, you are helping build a world where no one is without shelter after disaster.

CHALLENGES AND LESSONS LEARNED

Every year brings its own set of challenges, and 2024 was no exception. From operating in active conflict zones to dealing with the unpredictability of extreme weather, ShelterBox faced numerous hurdles in delivering aid. However, each challenge also offered lessons that we are taking to heart as we improve and prepare for the future.

Here we outline key challenges encountered in 2024 and the lessons learned from them.



CHALLENGE

Limited Media Attention

In 2024, many severe crises, like protracted conflicts in Africa, displacement in Cameroon, and recurrent floods in South Asia, went under-reported. While events like the Gaza conflict and U.S. hurricanes received media attention, the “media silence” around other disasters meant fewer resources for response, despite ongoing needs.

LESSON

Donor education and engagement are crucial.

We focused on storytelling and advocacy to highlight forgotten crises, sharing survivor stories to show why help was needed. We also became more proactive in raising awareness early, such as briefing media and donors on the Sudan refugee crisis and the Philippines storms. This helped mobilize support before the situations escalated. Diversifying fundraising, including leveraging Rotary and foundation grants, ensured we could respond to low-profile crises. The key takeaway: every crisis deserves attention, and we must find innovative ways to fund responses, regardless of media coverage.

CHALLENGE

Adapting to Climate Change Effects

Climate change is already intensifying disasters, with storms rapidly intensifying, droughts and floods occurring in the same regions, and unexpected areas experiencing extreme events, like cyclones in historically sheltered zones. Traditional planning based on past patterns is no longer reliable.

LESSON

Flexibility is key.

We’re diversifying aid stockpiles to ensure readiness for consecutive disasters and developing shelter solutions for varying climates. We also advocated at the 28th United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP28) and other forums for climate adaptation funding for shelter. By engaging in these discussions, we influence broader efforts to reduce disaster risk. Additionally, we’re collaborating with climate-focused partners to plan for emerging threats like urban wildfires and heatwaves.

CHALLENGE

Access and Security in Conflict Zones

In 2024, working in active conflicts like Gaza, Yemen, Syria, and Cameroon presented serious security and access challenges. In Gaza, border closures and airstrikes hindered supply deliveries, while in Cameroon and Somalia, insurgent activity required constant risk assessments for staff and beneficiaries.

LESSON

Working in conflict zones requires local knowledge and real-time intelligence.

Effective partnership and adapting delivery methods were essential. We relied on local partners with established access and community trust, providing them with training and resources. In Gaza, pre-positioning aid and using UN-coordinated convoys helped bypass security.



NAVIGATING OBSTACLES AND IMPROVING FOR THE FUTURE

CHALLENGE

Logistical Complexities in Remote and Widespread Disasters

In 2024, we faced major logistical challenges in disasters spanning large areas, like Hurricane Beryl hitting multiple islands, and flooding in Pakistan’s Sindh province, as well as in remote locations with limited access.

LESSON

Preparedness and local capacity are key.

Pre-positioning aid in strategic hubs, like Panama, allowed us to quickly bypass delays and send relief to Grenada. Similarly, stored aid from Cyclone Freddy in Malawi enabled a fast response to 2024 floods there. We also built local surge teams in disaster-prone areas, like Cebu in the Philippines, to lead immediate assessments and distributions. For large-scale disasters, we adopted modular and phased responses. In Pakistan, Phase 1 focused on accessible villages by road, while Phase 2 used boats to reach isolated communities. We also strengthened partnerships with logistics providers, like Airlink, to move aid faster and more cost-effectively. These lessons confirmed that being prepared and flexible in logistics can save lives.

CHALLENGE

Balancing Immediate Relief with Long-Term Recovery

Extended displacement (as in Yemen, Cameroon, or Burkina Faso) creates demand for permanent housing, but the added expense and complexity of long-term projects often clashes with donors’ focus on urgent relief.

LESSON

A “hybrid approach”

In 2024, ShelterBox began bridging relief and recovery with a “hybrid approach”—pairing emergency aid with resilience measures. In Yemen, we piloted Sahelian durable tents on raised concrete platforms, coupled with 15-year land tenure agreements, so families have secure homes for years. In Bangladesh, instead of repeatedly distributing emergency tarps, we funded raised earthen plinths and taught improved building techniques, helping homes survive floods and reducing annual relief needs. By listening to communities and integrating training, cash-for-work, and the provision of building materials, we met immediate needs while strengthening long-term resilience. Going forward, we’ll deepen this recovery focus and partner more closely with development organizations to turn temporary relief into lasting stability.

THE ULTIMATE LESSON OF 2024 IS ONE OF RESILIENCE

In reflecting on 2024, we recognize that every challenge we overcame was thanks to dedication, creativity, and sometimes sheer tenacity from our team and partners. Each lesson learned is being fed back into our plans, training, and policies. Disasters will continue to happen – possibly with greater frequency and complexity – but ShelterBox is committed to continuous improvement. Whether it’s enhancing our supply chain, strengthening partnerships, improving staff care, or innovating our shelter materials, we are evolving as the world changes.

The ultimate lesson of 2024 is one of resilience: both of the communities we serve and our own organization. We enter 2025 better prepared, with knowledge hard-won from the past year’s experiences guiding us towards ever more effective responses.

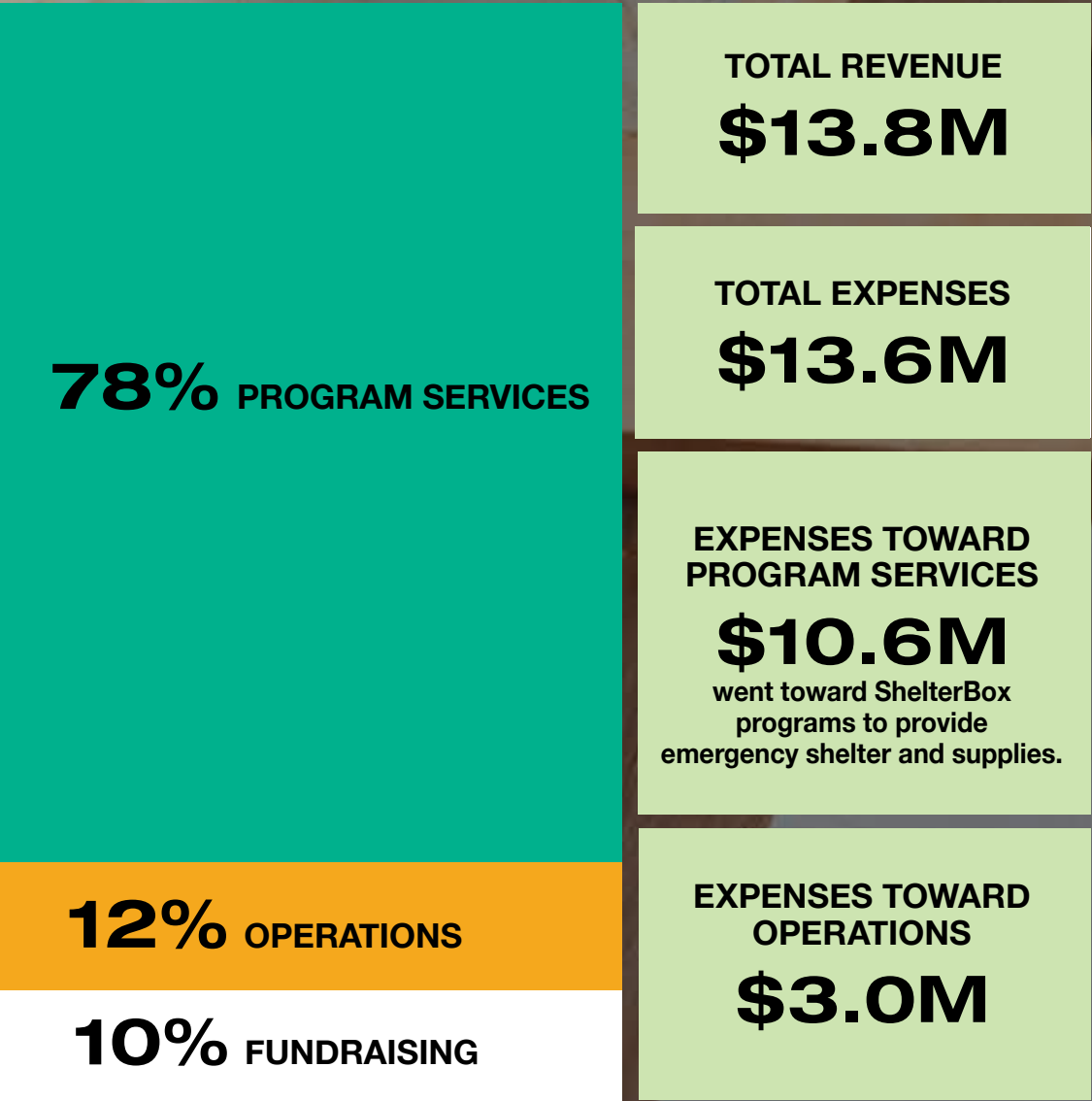

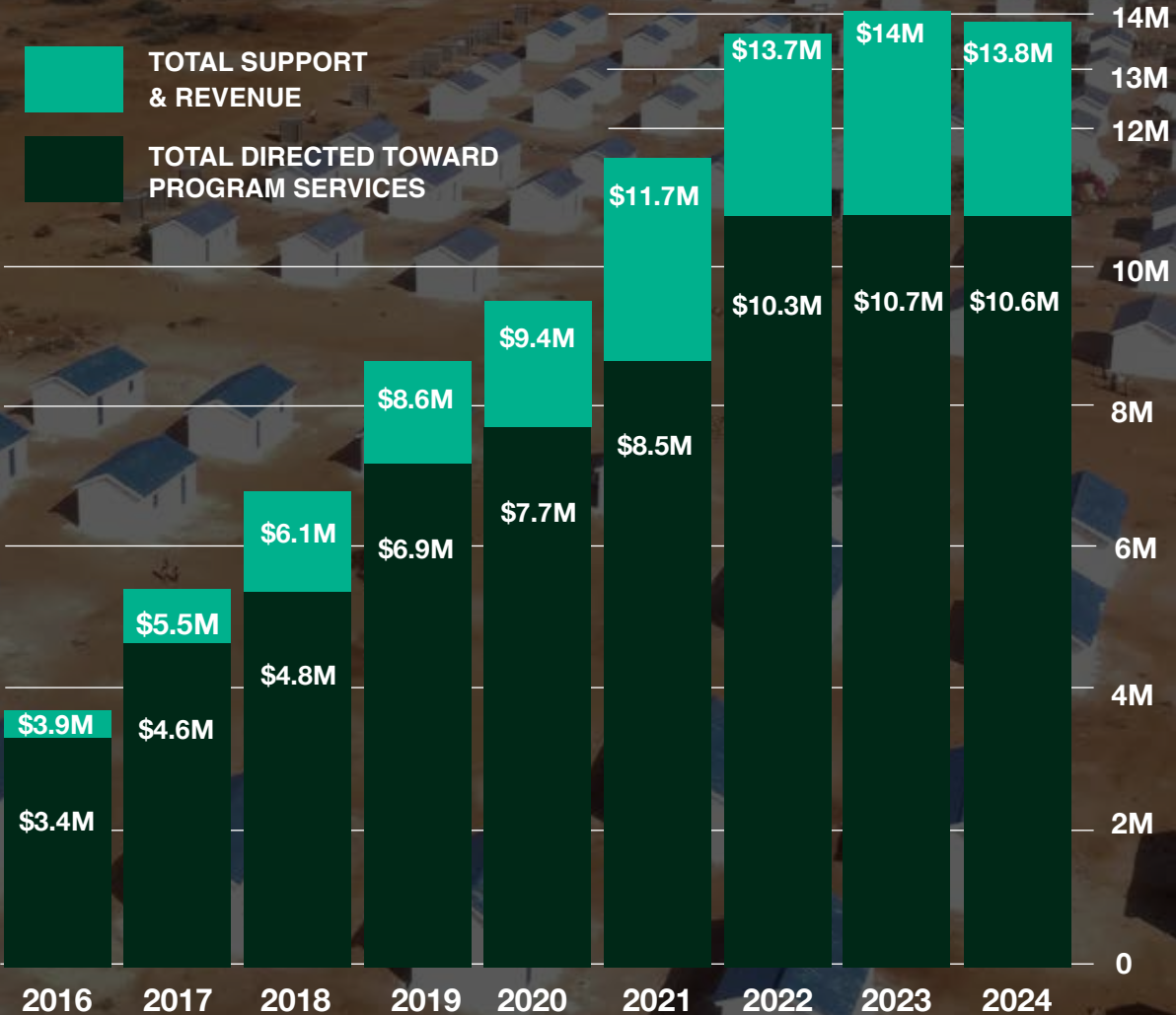
